The Royal Oak Nature Society had a Great Year

Last fall marked the completion of the Dragonfly Pond project at Tenhave Woods. With the generous help of volunteers and professionals willing to donate their time and services, we proved that we can accomplish great things! Now only nine months after completion we have seen dramatic differences in both plant and wildlife activity in the pond area.

Plans are also underway to add two more turnstiles at Tenhave Woods. These will allow better access to the park during the wet spring weather and provide additional exit points for safety.

Yet, even with the generous help of volunteers and occasional donated labor from the Department of Parks and Recreation, these projects cost money. Since the Royal Oak Nature Society receives no money from the city, we need to raise the funds for projects like these ourselves.

pounded the pavement towards a successful event. I thought I'd take the opportunity to congratulate the board and share a bit of our process with you.

Let's set a date! What time of year would work best? Not too close to the holidays! It can't interfere with summer vacations! After all the suggestions and reasoning we finally picked the 28th of April.

Location, location, location? Plenty of ideas here as well: local churches, meeting halls, the Royal Oak Women's Club, etc... Some were too expensive, some locations were already booked. 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Fall Speaker Programs

Sept. 6th Learn about the trees that make up the forests of Cummingston and Tenhave Woods from Bob Muller, a Royal Oak Nature Society naturalist. The diversity in our parks is great; we have 41 of the 52 species of deciduous trees that can be found in Oakland County. The forest, although it looks constant to us, is always changing. How did the trees get here after the ice age and where did they come from? What did the first settlers do to change the forest make up? Invasive fungus and insects have altered the forest in major ways three times in the 20th century. If this had happened in the 19th century would the impact been different? What can tree rings tell us about the trees life history? Trees are far more than what shades your yard and causes you to have to rake each fall. Come and learn about these major life forms that define the environment we live in.

Oct. 4th Humpback whales can be found in all of the world's oceans. Each fall, the whales migrate from their summer coastal feeding grounds in high latitudes to winter breeding grounds near islands or shallow banks at low latitude waters. The

Nature Walk Descriptions

Sept. 24th *Mushrooms* - lead by *Dianne Pruden*. We will survey the park and attempt to identify the mushrooms and fungus we encounter.

Oct. 8th *Beginnings of fall* - See the changes that are starting to take place within the forest.

Oct. 21st *Fall Color* - This is the most beautiful time to take a look at our nature study areas.

Nov. 11th *Fall Color* - This is still the most beautiful time to take a look at our nature study areas.

Hawaiian Islands are the major reproductive grounds for North Pacific humpback whales. Chris Zimmer is a volunteer-participant in the The Dolphin Institute (TDI) whale program. He will give us a peek (in sight and sound) into the hidden habits of humpbacks as they spend the winter months off Maui. Under the direction of Dr. Louis Herman and Dr. Adam Pack, The Dolphin Institute (TDI) has conducted scientific

study of humpbacks in Hawaii since 1975. This is the longest, continuous scientific study of humpbacks in the Hawaiian Islands.

Nov. 1st Andy Snider, Curator of Reptiles at the Detroit Zoo Institute, has been a speaker for us on two other occasions. He will be talking about several initiatives with which the Detroit Zoo is involved with the eastern massasauga

rattlesnake. A two-year educational program that was completed with a grant from the U.S. EPA in a 4-county region in southeast Michigan, will be discussed. The soon-to-be-completed Candidate Conservation Agreement with Assurances (CCAA) will be touched on, as well as a new head-start project for captive-reared animals from the Grayling population.

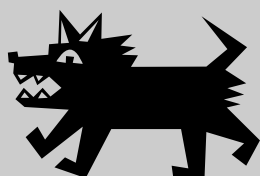

Royal Oak's Wild Side

On the last day of spring I took a walk through Tenhave Woods. Just into the forest on the Goodwin Trail, I spotted a quarter inch long toad. The polliwogs in Dragonfly pond had changed into adults. When I got to the pond's edge, they were everywhere. This is the first time this has occurred in the park in about fifteen years. Dragonflies were everywhere patrolling the pond's surface. I guess we gave the pond a good name. We have also identified the crayfish in Tenhave. They are digger crayfish, the same species we identified in Cummingston last spring. Dozens of new aquatic insects have shown up in our pond surveys that we have not seen in Tenhave before and the mosquito's population seems to be almost non-existent.

Five days later I met Don Drife in Tenhave to begin surveying the new plants we are finding along the pond.

Just into the woods off the ponds edge we noticed three deer, one of which was a six-point buck in velvet.

Fifteen minutes later while checking out the parks ferns, I stepped over a log and almost stepped on a fawn. Breeding deer in Royal Oak—amazing! I hope they find some place they like better than Tenhave as they will eat all of our wildflowers. We were only in the park an hour and in that time we saw a deer, gray and fox squirrels, a chipmunk

and a raccoon coming down a tree. Five mammals in an hour in the middle of Royal Oak!

I know any time you walk through our Royal Oak forest, there will always be something new to discover. Become an explorer; find something you have never seen before. Escape the developed world, take a breath, feel the stress fade away and take a walk in the woods. Check out Royal Oak's wild side.

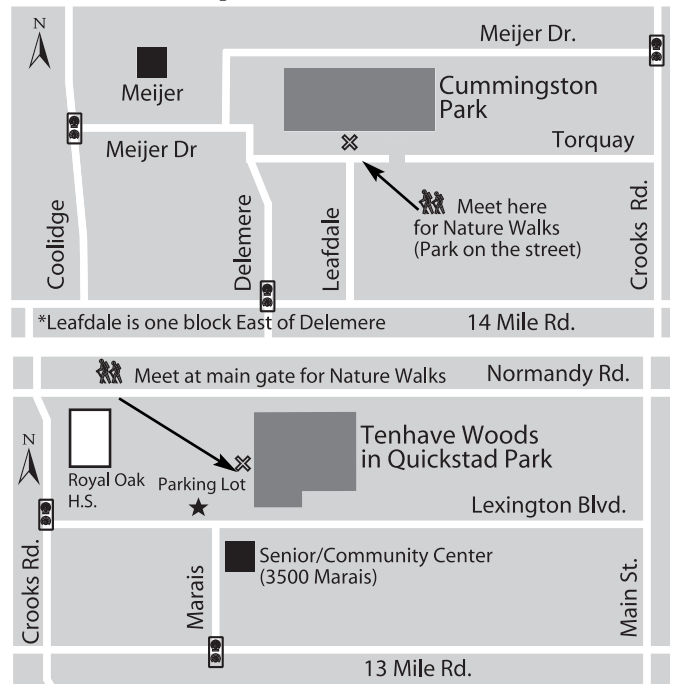
