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
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
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


## Take a Deeper Look at Speech And Literature



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



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## Sharing Ideals Large Part of Junior English

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


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# Languages, Communicate With the World

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


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


## Bonjour! Guten Tag! Buenos Dias!

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
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




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





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## History: Wars, Ruins, Maps, and Countries


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


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
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
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## Past Heritage Reflected in History




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
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## Arts, Crafts Help Stimulate Students' Minds

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
## Social Studies, Music and Arts and Crafts

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


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


## Math Is Key to Higher Education






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



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
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
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




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## Math Proves to Be Beneficial to Students

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



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# Biology + Physics + Chemistry = Science






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## Science Is Exploring New Phenomena

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


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## Gym Activities Help Girls Relax



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
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
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## Phys. Ed. Teaches Coordination and Teamwork

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
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




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
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
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

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## Mental Ability and Dexterity Needed in Shops


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## Industrial Arts Requires Skill and Creativity


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
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## Baseball Team Halted in State Finals




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## Cross Country Records Perfect Season, 9-0


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





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



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## Wrestling Team, Pride of Kimbball's Winter Sports


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


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## Tankers Finish Third in S.M.A. With New Coach



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





## Seniors


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
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

## Class of 74 Honors Clyde Ewell


## Knotable

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
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


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## Seniors Pick Variety of Class Subjects


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
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# Electives Help Students Spread Their Horizons

## Advertising
