


Seniors Drive Into the Stars

"This year was a huge success. Powderpuff was probably the most successful activity. It really brought out everyone's class spirit," stated Mrs. McClanaghan.



Pam Pround has played Varsity Softball for three years. As a junior she received honorable mention for all S.M.A.


Nikki Crowley has run track for four years. During her senior year, she served as a co-captain. She also earned the S.M.A. runner up and regional champion.



Paul Carey has shown hard work and dedication in the off season for Varsity Track. He has potential to do well on and off the field.


Marshall Colley has been an excellent runner for Cross Country. He was a captain this year, and received an academic excellence award.

Kelli Dennis has been a great tennis player for four years. She was a captain her senior year and earned the award Most Dedicated.


Lesley Polly has been on Gymnastics for four years. Each year she was a varsity letter winner. Leslie also exhibited outstanding leadership skills as part of the team.

Tiffany Newton has been a cheerleader for four years, serving as captain her senior year.





Weekends were always a favorite part of the school year. Two whole days of staying up all night





Stephanie Bemis complained, "I coach cheerleading for 5 to 10 year olds and sometimes I didn't have time to finish my homework."


Many students didn't have time for a job or just weren't old enough to get one. So Mom and Dad were still dishing out spending money this past year.















When students graduate from Kimball they leave understanding many different mathematical concepts.










Some students also had a chance to use the computers at Kimball in their English classes. The *Herald* also is all done by computer now, too.


"I haven't yet taken a computer class at Kimball, but I've used computers in my comp class and I'm interested in learning more about computer concepts," Laura Valko said.





"Biology is very educational. I will certainly use the knowledge I have gained from it in future endeavors," Dan Skwira said.



Even if science isn't your favorite subject, it is enjoyed by everyone.








"Since my schedule is so split up between both of the high schools, my bosses never know where I am. Too bad." **Mr. Miller** stated.


The A.V. staff works hard to make sure that the school operates correctly.






Not everyone who takes Driver's Education has a secure feeling about their roadwork experience, but the memories are quite interesting.

















EDUCATIONAL FACTS

Do American schools make the grade?

The United States is often comparing its educational programs with the other industrialized nations of the world. Unfortunately, most of the results of the U. S. standings have been far less than satisfactory to say the least. The Japanese educational system has often been viewed as the ideal educational system.

MYTH #1: Japanese students get superior education due to the time spent at school.

Actually, Japanese students have a school day consisting of six 50-minute classes, homeroom, and a lunch period. That adds up to thirty instructional periods in a 5-day week. However, three to four of these class periods are used for non-teaching purposes every week. Such activities include cleaning the school grounds, playing sports, etc. Therefore, students in Japan attend a half day on Saturdays to make up for those nonacademic periods they missed during the week.

MYTH #2: Japanese teachers work harder than U. S. ones.

In reality, Japanese teachers don't seem to work as hard as American ones. Out of 6 class periods per day, they teach three or possibly four classes.

And, they spend the remaining class periods in the faculty workroom. There they have their own desk where they do any or all of the following: grade papers, socialize, read, drink tea, smoke, and nap. They never use their "private time" for school work. This is totally different from American teachers. Our teachers spend many after-school hours working on school related projects and assignments. Most U. S. teachers consider teaching a 24-hour commitment and are willing to put in extra hours for needy students.

MYTH #3: The Japanese educational system doesn't separate different aptitudes.

Although they may not have "honors" classes, they do assign students to certain homerooms which do in fact dictate what type of classes they take.

MYTH #4: It is hard to enter a Japanese University, but easy to enter an American one.

It may be easier and less stressful to enter U. S. colleges, but the hard thing is to graduate from them. Applying to American universities can be done as early as the summer before your senior year. High school students can take required entrance

exams (SAT/ACT) as often as desired and at a convenient testing location. If you do very well the first time, but retake the test, you can send the better of the two to every university that you apply to.

The National Assessment of Educational Progress (NAEP) tested over 7,000 17 year olds in the late 1980's, on their knowledge of history. "The average score," they concluded, "was a 54%." I decided to test some of Kimball High School's seniors on their knowledge of history. The results were as follows:

Female:	73
Combined (M&F)	75

These results are encouraging, but show that we still have a long way to go to reach the status of superior education; but is there such a thing??



LINK has helped the leaders at Kimball take on their roles very successfully.


"LINK has taught me many organizational skills which have helped me with my job as Lancer's business editor," Leigh Sabo stated.

"I got a dog while I was here, I want to take him back to Japan with me. When I go I'm going to miss my dog and my host family," Yumi explained.


"I miss the food the most. I am trying to get used to American food," Yumi decided.



Sponsors of the club this year were **Greg Castle** and **Paul Engelberts**. Both said that the club is a great experience for kids to have.




The KHS Varsity Knights faced many challenges this year. Junior wide receiver **Thanh Nguyen** and



Jeff Harris runs down the field, determined to gain yardage for Kimball.































It takes a long time to make a swimmer. A lot of dedication, concentration, and motivation. Hopefully, our swim team will continue their upward move towards a winning season.













The Varsity soccer team played as if they were reaching to the sky. Instead, they pushed themselves and caught stars.









"I walk to keep in shape and it gives me a chance to socialize," explained Ms. Heintz.






spring softball season.












