




Royal Oak Builds A New High School

In the 1920's Royal Oak, was, as it is today, not a suburb, but a city in its own right. Stores, banks, and homes lined the main roads and in 1927 work had begun on a new (city) high school to accommodate the increasing population. The cost for this new building was \$925,000 with an additional \$35,000 for the swimming pool. There were 65 rooms meant for a student capacity of 1,215.











In 1927 the Oak was simply a semi-annual, 80 page paperback that was put out by the Acorn staff. 50 years ago there were 24 seniors pictured opposite their names, quotations, and high school activities.

Years after this, Dondero's yearbook became known throughout the world of photojournalism as the first yearbook ever to employ the gutter shot (a picture that runs into and across the middle of a two page layout).

Last year, in its second year of competition, the Bicentennial Oak took a second place award in the Columbia Scholastic Press Association. As a result of the comments and criticism of the 1976 edition, this year's staff has had the opportunity to experiment with several different techniques.

In 1977 there is a graduating class of over 500 students and the yearbook is nearly 300 pages, each of a diverse and distinctive nature. And still, there is a great deal to be said for the staff and the advisor. A staff that made our foreign exchange student from Switzerland, Chris Blaser, feel immediately at home. A staff that rushed both to meet deadlines and over to McDonalds (to get ads). A staff that could tolerate a tyrant and an advisor that put up with an inexperienced editor. These are the people that compiled the 1977 yearbook and it is only fitting that I congratulate them.










English is the largest department in the entire school. There are 18 teachers involved in a wide variety of English classes for over 1,900 students.


The Study of Languages


The basic German 1-4, French 1-4, and Spanish 1-4 classes are also offered. Advance Placement classes are provided for students in their fourth year of French and German.














Orchestra Is in Tune With the Times!

The Annual All-City Orchestra Concert was held in April with the Spring Concert following in June.



Dondero's art and craft students, with their skills and creativity, enrich their minds and continue to beautify the school.


Under the instruction of Mr. Fischer and Mr. Retell, students learn art theory, clay figuring, paper mache, pottery, sketching and more.











Ski Club Takes to the Slopes






























Business Classes Prepare Students For a Career


This year there are over 1000 students in Business classes, with ten teachers teaching a variety of these classes.

For the first time ever there is a class called "Careers in Business" and it is offered to all 9th and 10th graders. This class lasts one semester and is Dondero's newest addition to the Business Department.







Art Can Be Expressed With Machines Too










From the 28 different schools that participate in Seovec the school has a total enrollment of 15,080 students.




