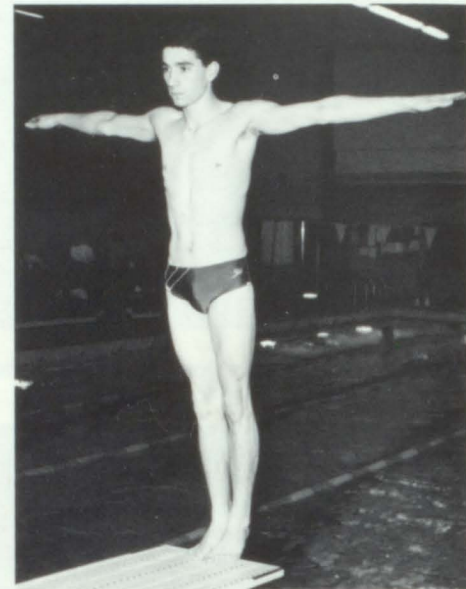

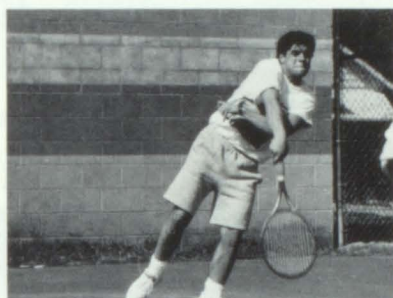

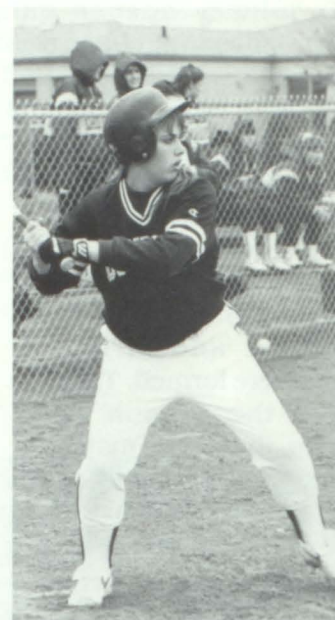

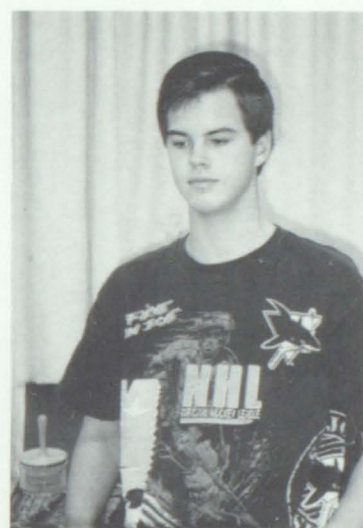

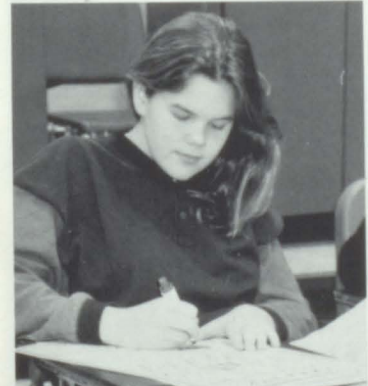

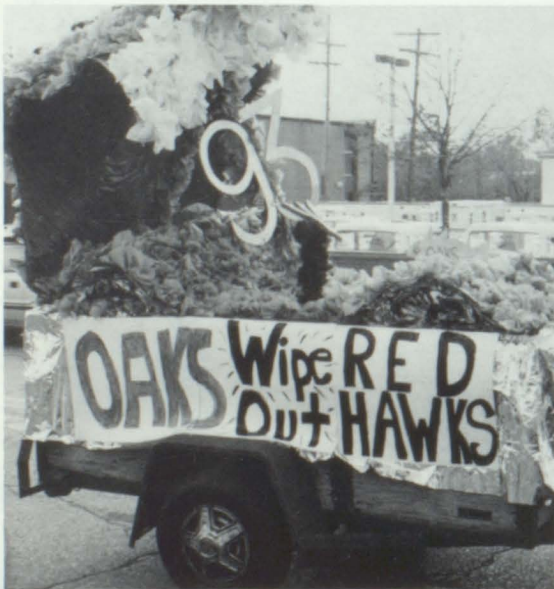

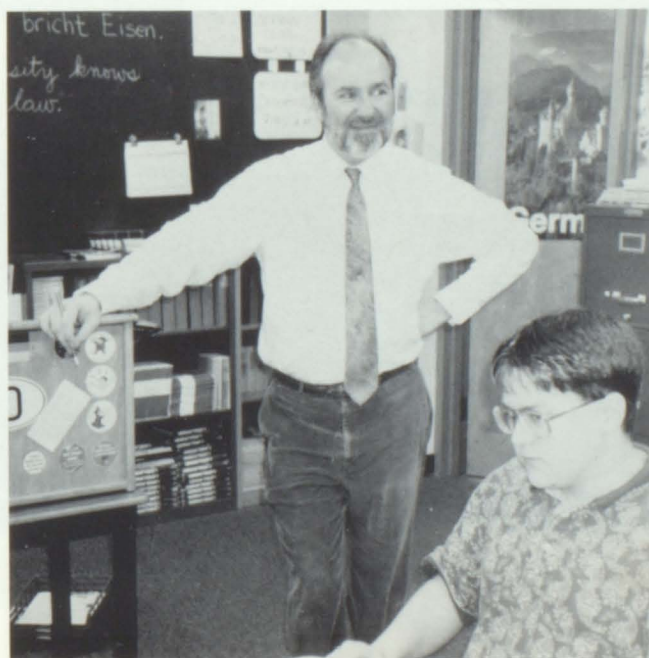
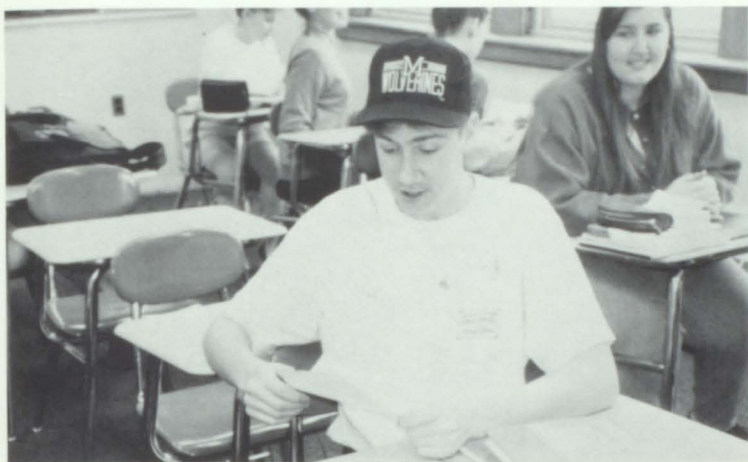
GERMAN, SPANISH, FRENCH

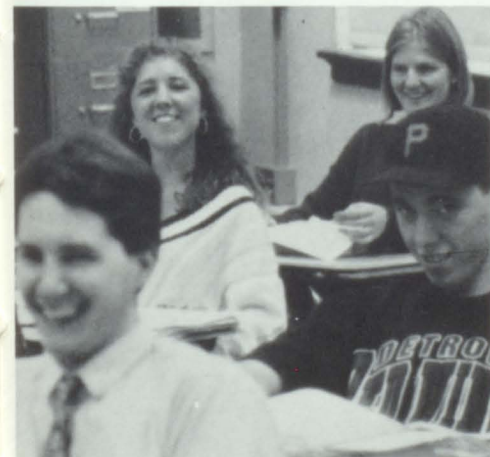

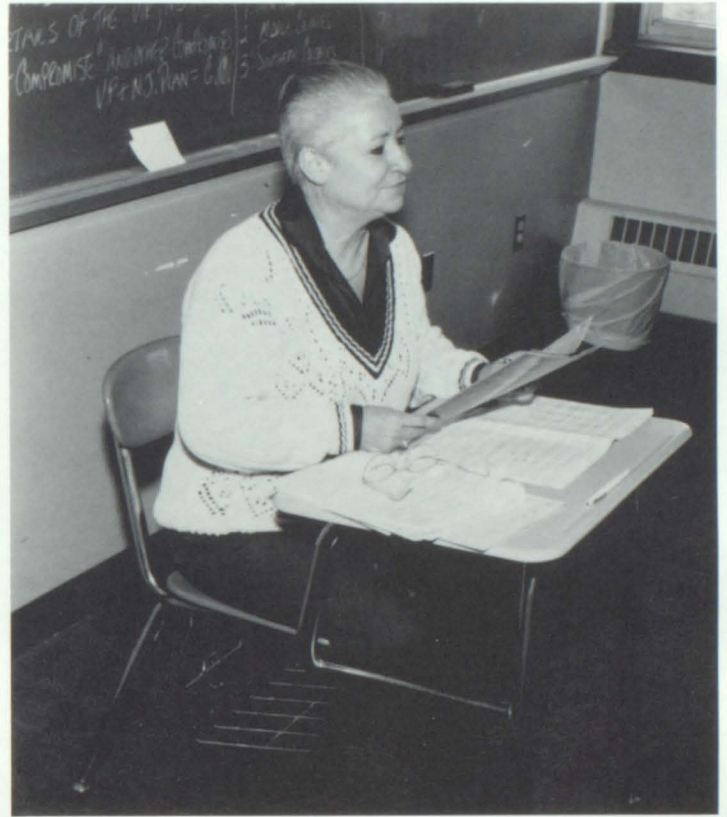

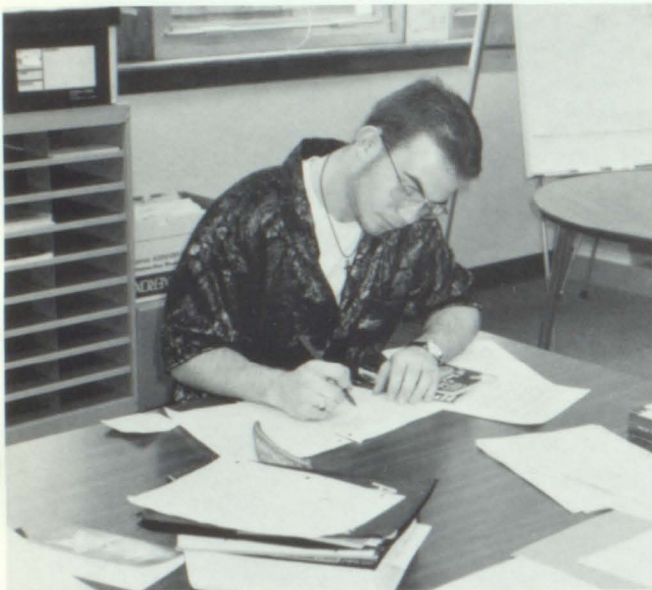


THE LEARNING CENTER

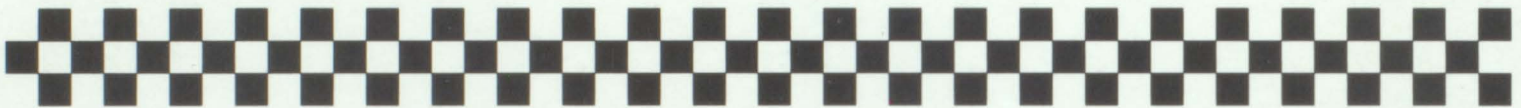
DONDERO'S PAST AND FUTURE

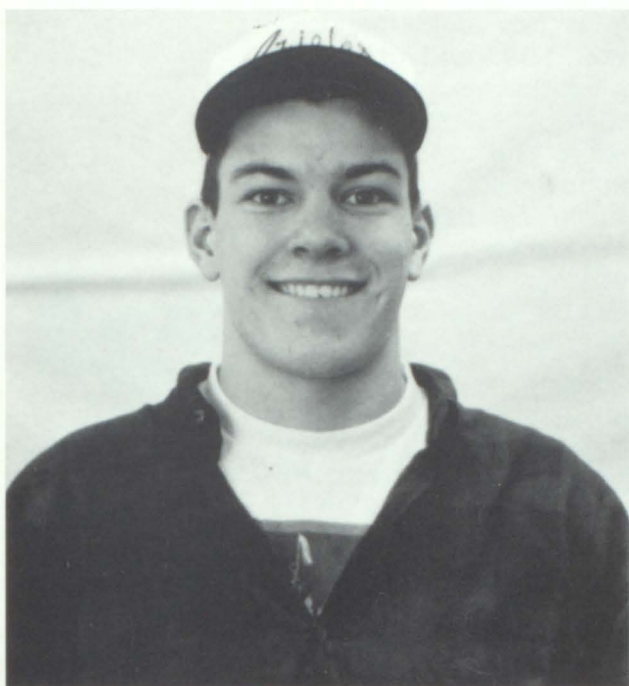

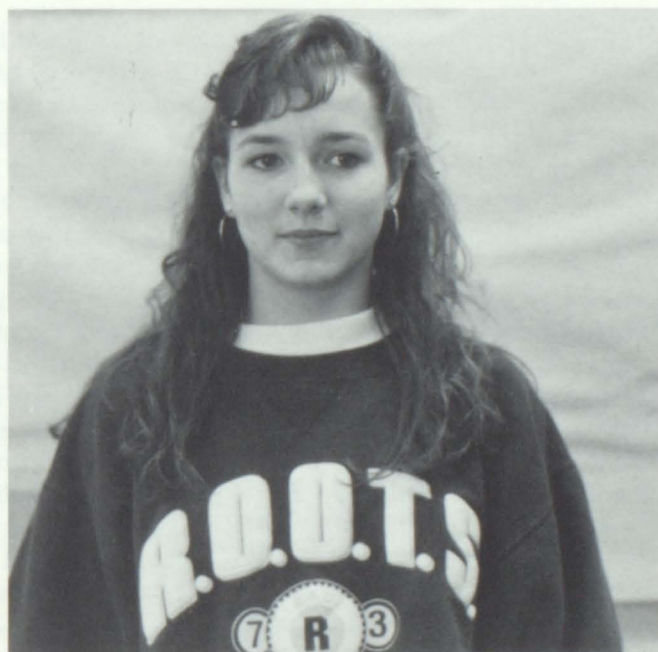
Christopher Scott Tillotson

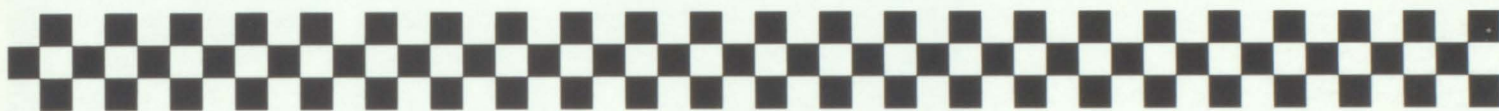

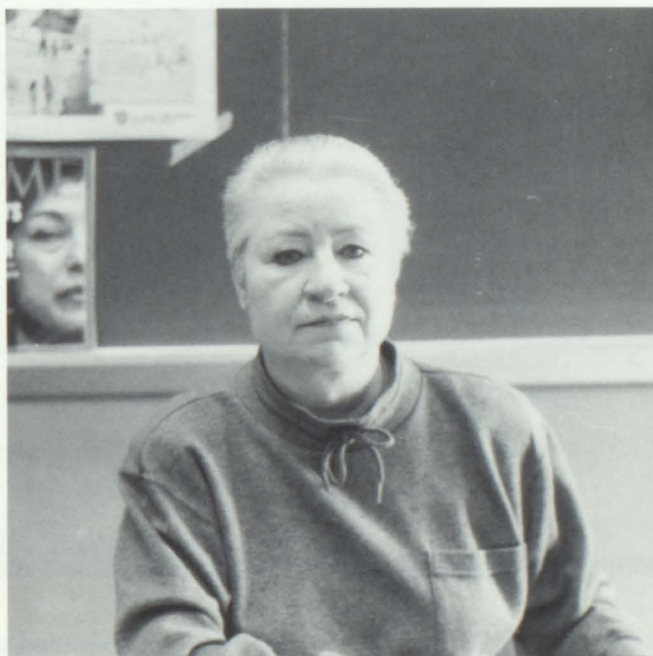
Dr. Kenneth Noble

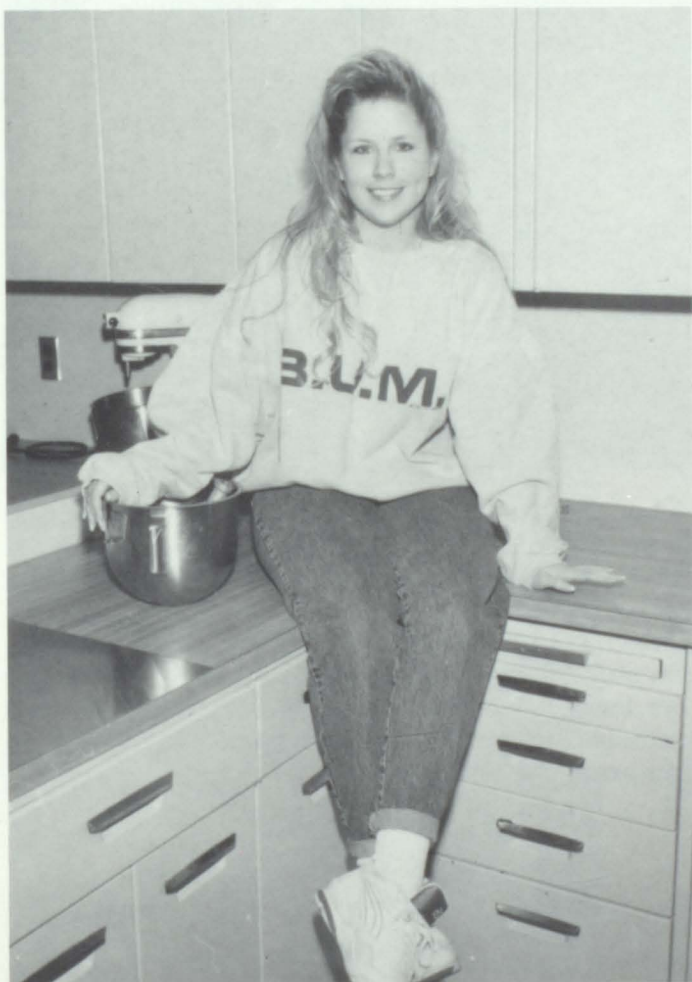
OUTSTANDING SENIORS

An awesome artist.

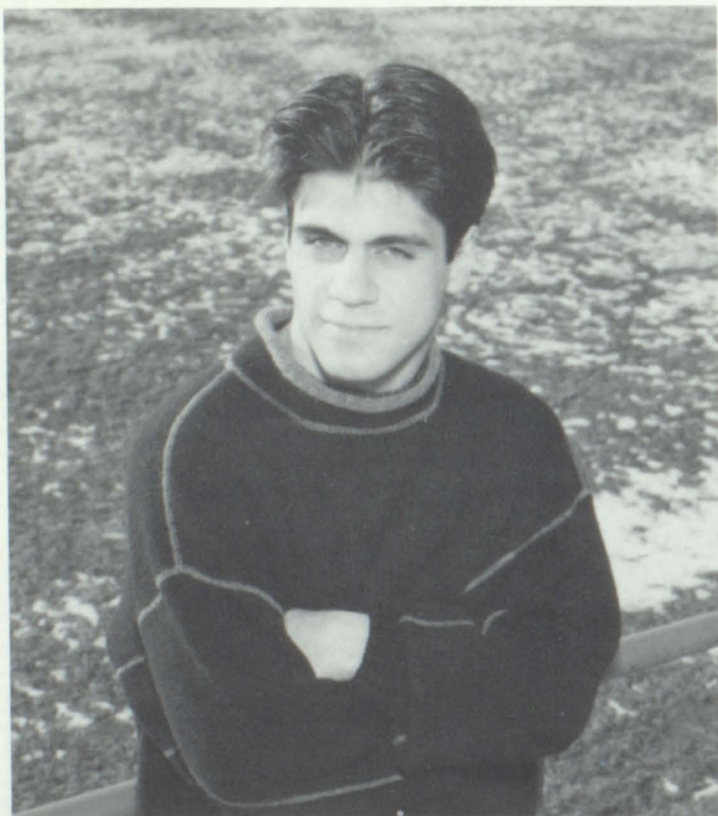
Not only do I think my artwork will change the way people see the world but also the way they perceive themselves as human beings.
